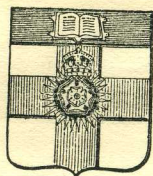


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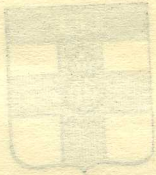

Applications for Courses

Forms on which to enter applications for a course or courses of lectures may be obtained from the Registrar. Local Committees are advised to submit the names of three or four Lecturers in order of preference, and every effort will be made to meet their wishes. If any subject or special course is desired which is not in this list, the Local Committee should communicate with the Registrar, who will do all in his power to make suitable arrangements. In addition to those whose names are included in the following list, some other University Lecturers are willing occasionally to deliver courses. Applications for Sessional Courses, or Courses extending over two Terms—Michaelmas and Lent—may be considered as soon as they are received; but applications for Terminal Courses cannot usually be settled before the end of April. The Committee wish to take this opportunity of pointing out to Local Committees the importance of arranging their courses, as far as possible, in educational sequence.

Except where otherwise indicated all courses in the list are Terminal Courses of ten or twelve lectures.

[S] signifies a Sessional Course, but a portion of it can, as a rule, be given as a Terminal Course.

(L) signifies that a lantern is essential. (The lantern and a competent operator must be provided by the Local Committee.)

(1) signifies that a lantern may be used if desired. (The lantern and a competent operator must be provided by the Local Committee.)

* prefixed to the name of a Lecturer or the title of a course signifies that special enquiry should be made of the Registrar as to the fee payable to the University, owing to the need for expensive apparatus, or the aid of an assistant for the illustration of the course, or the hire of lantern slides, or special arrangements as to written work, or some other circumstance.

† indicates that the Lecturer can give courses in London occasionally, or under special conditions.
